'Poppies' by Jane Weir


'The Prelude' by William Wordsworth

During their home learning time, students have produced outstanding work for their Maths teachers. They have been responding to feedback given by teachers, always challenging themselves further.





# **History**

Many of our students from across the year groups have continued working hard while the school has been closed, which is great to see. Year 7's produced some very impressive profiles of Henry VIII and Year 8 have begun studying why World War I started. What has been particularly impressive has been from Year 9, who have moved on to their GCSE studies, with many of them submitted exam question answers and then using the feedback from the History department to improve their answers.







# **Connecting Communities in Berkshire-Home energy** advice


