DofE LHEA UPDATE

Young People at Lynch hill Enterprise Academy to benefit from the Dofe Diamond Fund LHEA is delighted to announce that it has received a grand from the Duke of Edinburgh's Award (Dofe) Diamond fund to enable the school to reach and support more young people who want to do their Dofe in Slough.

The grant will fund new equipment for the expeditions, as well as 20 free places for next year's Silver award. This will help more young people be able to come on expedition and experience the thrill of spending quality time outside with their friends.

Through its Diamond fund, the DofE will be investing a total to £3 million over the next four years to increase the number of young people starting their DofE from 50,000 to 70,000 by 2021. The £3 million is made up of £1.5 million raised by over 15,000 supports in the DofE's Diamond Anniversary year (2016), £1 million from the #iwill fund for England- a joint initiative from the National Lottery Community Fund and the Department for Digital, Culture, Media & Sport- and additional DofE donations to double the Diamond Anniversary fundraising in Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland. #iwill is a UK-wide campaign which aims to get 6 out of 10 young people involved in social action by the end of 2020.

Through LHEA's DofE programme, more young people in the area will develop life changing skills such as communication, resilience and team work; create new friendships, and gain the confidence to reach their potential.

Mrs Tate-Harratt, the school's DofE manager says that she is: "very excited to have received the grant from the DofE's Diamond fund. It is an exciting opportunity for us to raise the profile of the DofE around school and to allow more young people to participate in such a prestigious award".

Peter Westgarth, Chief Executive of the Duke of Edinburgh's Award says, "We are delighted to grant LHEA money from the #iwill DofE Diamond fund to enable even more young people in Slough the opportunity to do their DofE. The life changing benefits of a DofE programme should be readily available to any young person who wants to help themselves to go further in life". The DofE is widely acknowledged as the world's leading achievement award for young people. DofE programmes enable any young person aged 14-24 to develop key skills for life and work such as confidence, commitment and team working. Those who achieve a Bronze and Silver DofE Award will volunteer, learn a skill, get fit and undertake an expedition. Those who achieve a Gold Award will also take part in a week long residential.

There are currently over 430,000 young people doing a DofE programme across the UK through a variety of centres, including both state and independent schools, special schools, businesses, prisons, young offender institutions and youth groups.

Science Extra





Science in a Box is a programme which is delivered by Pfizer STEM and SIP ambassadors which include Senior Clinical Scientists and Undergraduate students that have kindly given up their time to deliver these workshops. Their aim is for students to learn more about medicine development, the role of the pharmaceutical industry and to demonstrate the range of career opportunities that exist in the pharmaceutical industry.








Topics covered in sessions 3 - 5 included Molecule & Medicine development and Clinical trials.

Students were exposed to some A level chemistry concepts when they were looking at molecular strucutres, they learnt about some of the techniques involved in identifying the strucuture of potential pharmaceutical agents.

In session 4 the students learnt about designing stable structures, modes of delivery and the impact of bulking agents when putting together medical preparations.

Year 7 Readathon

Lynch Hill Enterprise Academy is running a Read for Good Readathon (a sponsored reading event) and the whole of year 7 are taking part! Every student in year 7 has been given a sponsor card and a letter to parents/guardians explaining the sponsored read.

Kev Dates:

<u>During the half term holiday</u> – students fill out their sponsor card by naming the books they will read and collecting sponsorships from friends and family.

25th February - 10th March - students read as often as they can in school and at home to complete their personal book challenge that they wrote in their sponsor card.

17th March – deadline for bringing any sponsor money into school. All parents/guardians have to do is:

- 1. Take a look at what books the students plan to read, or help them complete their list of books to read. Remember they can read whatever they want: books, e-books, poetry, comics anything goes!
- 2. Help your child find sponsors among family and friends. The easiest way to sponsor a child is at:

https://readathon.secure.force.com/sponsor (which family and friends can use too) or return the sponsor card with a cheque(s) or cash sent to school.

The charity 'Read for Good' encourages children to read, inspiring reluctant readers to give reading a go, and keen readers to read more widely. Pupils can choose whatever they want to read - from comics to classics and audio books to blogs - they are not being assessed, it's all about reading for fun. And, they are motivated to read because the money they raise in sponsorship helps to provide a regular supply of <u>brand new books and a resident storyteller to every major children's hospital in the UK.</u>

Please support your child's sponsored read as much as you can. They will be helping children in hospitals get books, as well as helping themselves.

Year 11 Whitechapel History trip



As part of their History GCSE studies, students learn about Crime and Punishment and in particular Whitechapel in East London in the 1880s. This notoriously poor, overcrowded crime ridden borough was brought to worldwide attention in the autumn of 1888 as a result of five murders committed by the serial killer Jack the Ripper.

To give our Year 11s a better idea of what Whitechapel is like and why the area was so poor and dangerous, 22 students took part in a tour of the borough. Walking the same streets where Jack's victims plied their trade, visited the once notorious Spitalfields market (now a lunch haunt of many Whitechapel and City office workers) and we saw other landmarks such as a former soup kitchen for poor Jews and Toynbee Hall, once home to reformer Samuel

The trip would not have been possible without the help of Miss Ahmed who also acted as chief photographer. The students were engaged throughout the tour and fantastically behaved at all times, even through cancelled trains and delayed tubes. They were a credit to themselves and Lynch Hill Enterprise Academy.

Counselling is a way of helping Young People explore their innermost thoughts and feelings in a safe, supportive, non-judgemental and confidential environment with a trained professional.

We have 2 Counsellors in school on a Tuesday and Thursday, to support students. Nicole Wilkinson and Carol Phillips will be helping students through many issues that they face from family troubles and relationships, depression, stress and anxiety to mention a few. Within a safe, trusting and accepting environment, students will have the space and time, to help them make sense and cope with what difficulties they are having.

Counselling does not give them the solutions, but empowers them to grow, develop and change.
